New TCOLE Executive Director Chief Gregory Stevens





Following a candidate search and interviews, the Texas Commission on Law Enforcement (TCOLE) has announced Chief Gregory Stevens as its selection for the next agency Executive Director effective January 8, 2024.

Presiding Officer Kim Lemaux said, "We are thrilled to announce Chief Gregory Stevens as the next TCOLE Executive Director. His extensive law enforcement background, combined with his military and educational experience, made him an ideal candidate. The commissioners and I look forward to working with him in this role, and we thank General Counsel John Beauchamp for his service as Interim Executive Director during this period of transition."

Stevens most recently served as Chief of Police of the Rockport Police Department. Prior to that, he retired after more than 26 years with the Lubbock Police Department, including nearly four years as Chief of Police. He is a graduate of the FBI National Academy and the Law Enforcement Management Institute of Texas (LEMIT) Leadership Command College, and holds a Bachelor of Science in Criminal Justice from Wayland Baptist University and a Master's of Business Administration from Texas Tech University. Additionally, he served his country as a military police officer and a Naval Intelligence Officer.

"I am excited for the opportunity to lead an agency with a critically important mission at a time of growth and potential," said Chief Stevens. "The staff and I will continue to build on the partnerships with the law enforcement community, state leadership, and the public that we recognize as vital to successfully carrying out our responsibilities."

The mission of the Texas Commission on Law Enforcement, as a regulatory State agency, is to establish and enforce standards to ensure that the people of Texas are served by highly trained and ethical law enforcement, corrections, and telecommunications personnel.




Joe Nichols joins TCOLE as an Investigator VI in the Enforcement Division.



New Courses in MyTCOLE

Education Services has created two brand new courses, "Finding Wellness – Building a Healthier Life" (course #4202) and the "3188: Legislative Update" (course #3188). Both instructor resource guides can be found on the TCOLE website. Please note, "Finding Wellness – Building a Healthier Life" has handouts attached to the file that instructors are required to use. The legislative update will not come with an accompanying PowerPoint presentation. *Please be advised that both 3188 and 4202 are mandatory courses for the 2023 – 2025 training unit for all peace officers.*

Course Updates

The Basic Peace Officer Course #1000736 is now available. The new course hours are 736, minimum. Training coordinators must implement the new curriculum by January 1, 2024.

The Supplemental Peace Officer Course #1018 has been updated. The course hours have increased to 174 hours, minimum. The Supplemental Peace Officer Course consists of seven chapters from the Basic Peace Officer Course. Please refer to the Basic Peace Officer Course curriculum (1000736) for student learning objectives and course content. Training coordinators must implement the new curriculum by January 1, 2024.

The Special Forces Veterans Course #1030 has been updated. Please note that the hours have increased to 501, minimum. The Special Forces Veterans course consists of thirteen chapters from the Basic Peace Officer Course. Please refer to the Basic Peace Officer Course curriculum (1000736) for student learning objectives and course content. Training coordinators must implement the new curriculum by January 1, 2024.

2023 RACIAL PROFILING REPORTING

Racial Profiling Reporting will open on January 1, 2024.

*PLEASE NOTE: The reporting period for stops made in 2023 will begin on January 1, 2024. Reports must be filed by March 1, 2024.

All agencies must report Exempt or Full Reporting, and must submit a Comparative Analysis (Texas Occupations Code 1701.164)

All agencies are REQUIRED to submit both the TCOLE fill form report and the Comparative Analysis report (unless filling EXEMPT). You will be given two options when filling your Comparative Analysis:

- Use the SAMPLE COMPARATIVE ANALYIS supplied by TCOLE, or
- Upload your own COMPARTIVE ANALYSIS supplied by an outside vendor.

Submission Information

Texas Occupations Code 1701.164 specifies that TCOLE collect incident-based data in accordance with the Code of Criminal Procedure Article 2.131 – 2.138.

Chief administrators of law enforcement agencies that meet criteria must submit racial profiling reports to:

- · their governing body,
- · as well as TCOLE via TCLEDDS.

Reporting Options

Each agency must file an annual online report by selecting and completing the reporting option that applies to their agency. Reports are filed through TCLEDDS. The reporting period for the **previous** year begins on January 1st and ends March 1st.

The Reporting options are:

- 1. **Exempt** Agencies that do not routinely make motor vehicle stops should fill out the 1 page online exempt status form. The exempt status report contains agency general public contact information for questions about its racial profiling filing status. Some agencies are not required to file annual reports. A statistical analysis is not required on EXEMPT STATUS.
- 1. **Full Reporting** Agencies that routinely perform traffic stops or motor vehicle stops must file by online report. **The online report requires the completion of agency general public contact information and requires completion of <u>both</u>:**
- An **online form** about the numbers of motor vehicles stops made **and**,
- <u>Uploading a separate PDF comparative analysis document containing a statistical analysis of its</u>
 <u>motor vehicle stops compared to the gender and ethnic population of the agency's reporting</u>
 <u>area.</u> The second document must also contain a statement as to if racial profiling complaints were made
 against the agency and if so, a listing of all racial profiling complaints and the corresponding resolutions.

Please be advised that failure to submit the required report within the designated reporting period may result in license action against the chief administrator and/or civil penalties against the agency under CCP 2.134(g) and 2.1385(a), respectively.


